Orkin/PCO Welcomes EHO Group at St. John's Office



St. John's EHOs at Information Session on Birds and Bedbugs at Orkin/PCO

Bed Bugs and Birds

EHOs from the St. John's Office were invited to the local Orkin/PCO Office for an information session regarding the problems being experienced in the area with respect to bedbugs and birds.

PCO provided information on the increase locally of both of these types of pests. As many of you are aware there has been an influx of bedbugs complaints throughout North America this year. It has made national

headlines in Toronto with the International Film Festival. They advised that they have a specially trained dog that can 'sniff out' the bedbugs just like a customs dog that checks for drugs. The dog called "Dottie" is utilized especially in sensitive situations like public places.

With respect to the birds they discussed their wildlife pest management activities. Birds are a problem now that many

landfills have changed the way they operate and now the birds have to move further to get food and therefore have become a problem for residential garbage collection in many areas. Seagulls which are a protected species have very specific guidelines on how to deter them as you cannot kill them. Many business premises are utilizing the fake owl on a telescopic pole to deter birds away from the ventilation systems.

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Service Excellence

The Department of Government Services has taken on the initiative with the Department of Human Resources, Labour & Employment to have their staff receive training in Service Excellence. The process has been ongoing for almost a year with the majority of staff having received this training.

Service Excellence is a strategy on how to deal

with clients, colleagues and the public by recognizing their communication style and our own so that we can more effectively provide excellent service to everyone.

To date approximately 19 EHOs have taken the training. As well, part of the session was 'Insights' which helped us figure out our own style. 53% of

EHOs were **Blue** so they want the "details, 32% were **Yellow** and they want to be 'involved', 10% were **Green** and they want to know you 'care' and 5% were **Red** and they want everyone to be brief, be bright and be gone.

So as a profession it shows that we really want to know the details and be involved. It seems to fit.

Eastern Region – cont'd

In St. John's, staff meetings have been held bi-monthly to discuss issues as they arise and to plan workload.

Upcoming September and October EHOs for the entire area are participating in training of food service workers in the Eastern School District. This is in conjunction with the Eastern School District and their session regarding the new nutritional requirements for schools.

Cupids 400 events were very successful and EHOs from the Avalon Region were involved from the
